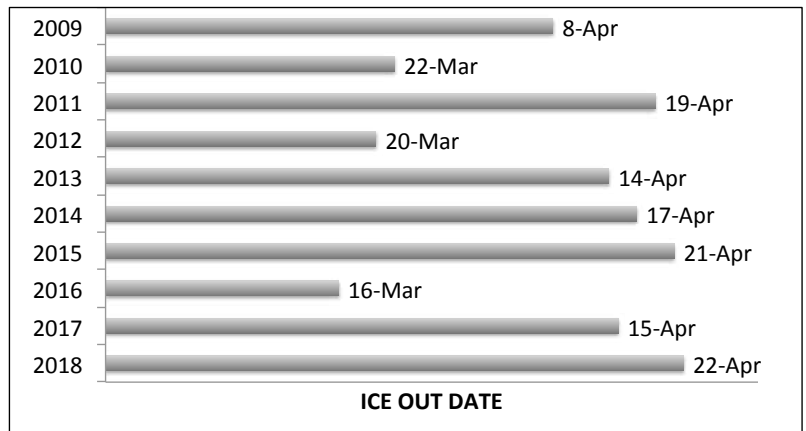

Shoreland (Your Land) Protection Update 2018

The state and the town of Wakefield are partners in protecting the water quality in Lovell Lake and the other town water resources. The primary purpose of state legislation and the town regulations is to prevent stormwater runoff from reaching and polluting the lake.

For the past decade, the zoning regulations of the town have included the requirements of the State's Shoreland Protection legislation, which is the Shoreland Water Quality Protection Act (SWQPA). Now the town has taken on a more active role in the enforcement of the SWQPA. The State regulations require a permit for most construction activities undertaken in the shoreland zone, which includes all land within 250 feet of the high water mark.

The SWQPA states "the shorelands of the state are among its most valuable and fragile natural resources and their protection is essential to maintain the integrity of public waters. The public waters of

New Hampshire are valuable resources held in trust by the state. The state has an interest in protecting those waters and has the jurisdiction to control the use of the public waters and the adjacent shoreland for the greatest public benefit."

As of July 2017, the town also requires a permit for construction activities in the R2 Zone, which includes all land within 500 feet of the high water mark on all lakes and ponds. The town permit costs \$25 and can be obtained at the Land Use Office in Town Hall. The town is empowered to enforce the State permit requirements and plays an active role in making sure the intent of the SWQPA is carried out, that of protecting water quality in our lake. If you need a state permit for construction, you will also need a town permit. You'll need a town permit for construction between 250 to 500 feet from the lake.

There are simple do's and don'ts that will ensure that we are not part of the pollution problem. We have an expert available to help us get the job done AND protect the Lake. Don't get into problems after the fact, call before you dig or build!

For more information, visit or call the Land Use office (on the ground floor of Town Hall) to determine if your work will require a state and/or a town permit and get advice on how best to proceed. Water Quality Update 2018 *BE PART OF THE SOLUTION*

Each year we report on the state of the lake's water quality. It's easy to ignore these yearly reports since no one year produces drastic changes. Changes in water quality slowly creep over time, and in the case of Lovell Lake it is still moving in the wrong direction. Water quality in a lake looks good until it

hits a tipping point and then it's bad and getting worse. The enclosed Water Quality Report shows the water quality in Lovell Lake is still headed downhill, as seen by the increasing amount of phosphorus. As phosphorus increases so also do weeds and algae, resulting in a loss of water clarity, heavy weed growth, and a downward trend for property values. The data from 2017 confirms the model with phosphorus over 8 parts.

The primary cause of the increasing phosphorus is polluted runoff reaching the lake. So what is the future for Lovell Lake? Does the next generation get to enjoy the lake the same way we have? That's up to all of us, the future is in our own hands. The good news is that correcting the negative trend now is cheap. The bad news is that fixing the problem after we go over the edge is infinitely more costly and may not be possible.

All of our properties drain into the lake and affect the water quality. When rain hits the ground and snow and ice melts, the resulting water either goes into the ground or runs over the ground and into the lake. Runoff picks up pollutants such as common soil and sand, fertilizers, pesticides, manure, and petroleum products and deposits them into the lake. To protect the lake, all of the runoff should be soaked up by the ground, with none of it reaching the lake. When water penetrates the ground, pollutants are filtered out and don't get into the lake water.

What are the common conditions that cause this pollution to reach the lake, carried by runoff?

- Lakeside beaches that allow sand to wash into the lake
- Lawns with no lakeside buffer
- Adding fertilizer to lawns and gardens
- Failed septic systems
- Bare soil areas where runoff picks up soil
- Straight paths that act as a channel for runoff to reach the lake
- Lots cleared of vegetation along the water
- Lots largely covered with impervious materials where water has no place to penetrate the ground
- Steeply sloped roads and drives that collect and channel water to the lake

If your lot has any of these features, your land is part of the problem and needs to be corrected. Luckily, easy inexpensive solutions are available, as well as the technical support needed to make them happen. Simple corrective measures such as rain gardens, buffer strips, infiltration steps, plunge pits and rip-rap trenches solve most problems. They will also beautify your property and can usually be completed with hand tools at low cost.

Lake Host Program

Invasive aquatic species of plants and animals continue to plague New Hampshire lakes, yet Lovell Lake is still un-infested and remains clear and pristine for everyone to enjoy. One major reason for this is the Lake Host program, under which boats are inspected for invasive plants before entering the Lovell Lake at the public launch. The 2018 Lake Host Season officially begins on Saturday, May 26th, and the ramp will be staffed on weekends from 9am – 5pm throughout June. Beginning on June 30th, staffing will increase to 7 days a week from 7am – 7pm. This year we would like to welcome Denise Perry who has been hired as our Lake Host Manager. She will be scheduling and supervising our six lake hosts and taking care of most of the administrative duties required by New Hampshire Lakes Association.

Unfortunately, this year we have lost the generous funding by our “anonymous” donor. We have enough money to cover the 2018 season, as we’ve accumulated some unused funds over the past few years. However, we will need additional funding for 2019. Also, after 16 years this will also be my final year as the Lake Host Point Person. New Hampshire Lakes requires a volunteer from every lake participating in the Lake Host program, **so someone from Lovell Lake needs to come forward and volunteer to take over the position.** Information about the program and the Point Person position can be found on <https://nhlakes.org/education/lake-host/>.

Please stop by the ramp and say hello to our Lake Hosts who work very hard to protect Lovell Lake. Volunteers are also needed during the month of June when our ramp coverage is limited to Saturday and Sunday. Choose a day and time that works for you and know you are helping to protect Lovell Lake and our property values.

Acton Wakefield Watersheds Alliance 2018

Meet Amy Arsenault, Program Manager for the Acton Wakefield Watersheds Alliance. Amy is responsible for many of the AWWA programs in Wakefield and Acton, including:

- Organizing and overseeing construction on Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) projects
- Developing water-related educational programs for Wakefield and Acton elementary schools. The mission of the program is to create and foster a love and protection for our water resources



- Recruiting, training and supporting volunteer educators for school programs
- Delivering the hands-on programs in the classroom
- Providing technical support for landowners around the lakes and ponds to eliminate runoff and pollution
- Creating site-specific landscape designs using accepted Best Management Practices (BMPs) for homeowners participating in AWWA's technical assistance program
- Following up on the designs to support effective completion
- Publicizing AWWA programs to towns and landowners through outreach materials, press releases, direct communication, lake association outreach, and signage
- Maintaining and updating the AWWA website

What's going on with AWWA in Spring 2018 and what can we expect for the rest of the year?

- Youth Conservation Corps (YCC)
 - We are currently recruiting new YCC projects, starting with a technical assistance visit before becoming eligible to access free labor through the YCC crew
 - Recruiting and hiring the YCC crew and leadership
 - We are expecting to have 4 – 6 crew members
 - Typically the crew completes 15 – 20 projects each summer
 - The YCC season starts June 25th and ends August 17th
 - We are hoping to do more projects on Lovell Lake than the three we completed in 2017
 - If you see the YCC working, feel free to stop and check out the project, or ask questions

Obituaries

Buck Howe, 73, died May 25, 2017, as the result of injuries sustained in a car accident. He was the husband of Ann Gouvalaris Howe of Amherst and son of the late Philip and Mary Howe of Hampton. For the last 33 years, he called Amherst his home but his heart always resided at "Camp" on Lovell Lake in Sanbornville. His family has had a cottage on the lake since 1929. During his early years, Buck was a newspaper reporter and editor on the NH Seacoast. As a freelance photographer, Buck worked for a variety of Fortune 100 companies and had a photo published in Life magazine. He later transitioned to high tech marketing and public relations for the Digital Equipment Corporation and other well-known companies. Professionally, he was most proud of his 10+ years as an adjunct professor of business at the University of New Hampshire (Whittemore School of Business and Economics and the Peter T. Paul College of Business and Economics). He retired in 2017. His affection for Lovell Lake had no bounds. For many years, he competed enthusiastically in the Sunfish sailboat races. His fishing prowess was well-known and he was a familiar figure trolling on the lake in his pontoon boat and taking photos of the wildlife and scenery. He authored a children's book, *The Adventures of Louie the Little Loon of Lovell Lake*, that included his photos of loon parents raising their chick. Besides his wife, Buck is

Treasury Notes

Last year we had another very successful year financially to fund the programs implemented to protect our lake from invasive plants and animals and monitoring the quality of the water. For years our organization has received some assistance from the Town of Wakefield, a small grant from the state of New Hampshire managed by the NH Lakes Association, and a unanimous grant for our lake host program again managed through the NH Lakes Association. For 2018, We expect the Town of Wakefield will continue to support our lake host program at the same level as last year. The grant from the state have dropped in recent years as more communities implement lake host programs. And finally, our unanimous grant has gone away.

Our Preventative Programs:

- Lake Host Program – We pay lake host trained individuals to inspect boats to prevent exotic plants and animals from ever entering our pristine lake. Last year we started paying a point person to oversee their daily activities. For a long time, Anusia Hirsch has managed this entire program as a volunteer. Starting this year, we will hire a person to manage the lake host program. Between the loss of the unanimous grant (\$5,200) and adding paid positions to manage the lake host program, our expected cost for 2018 will increase over \$6,500.
- Water Quality & Weed Watch – We ended last year discussing expanding our water quality program from seasonal to a year-round effort and increasing the scope of the testing. I expect we will increase the scope of this program and continue to look for ways to protect our lake.

General Fund

The \$3,100 budget pays for the Lovell Lake Newsletter and

annual decal, insurance, PO Box rent and postage, the annual meeting and the boat parade.

Other Programs We Support

- Bob Tucker Memorial Scholarship – Given annually to college bound area residents and children/grandchildren of our members. The \$750 scholarship is funded only from donations specifically identified for the scholarships.
- New Hampshire Lake Association – We are a member of this association, which helps with the We are a member of the association. They help with the administrative functions needed for our Lake Host Program and support legislative efforts in New Hampshire. We budget Dues of \$300 per year.
- Loon Preservation Committee – We make annual donations to the committee and support their efforts preserving our Loon population.

We are Financially Sound

We live within our budget that is set each year. We are able to pay our bills even though most are payable before the annual dues are due. We continue to keep our annual dues at only \$25. We are able to make annual contributions to our Exotic Plant and Animal War Chest, so we will be able to react immediately if the need arises. We are able to do all this because of the generous donations made by our members, community and town. All of our officers are volunteers. Please thank those on the Donor List for their generous donations. Your donations do make a difference.

Now more than ever, it is important that every resident on the lake become a member. Please encourage your non-member neighbors to join.
